<u>Arrangement of Counselors and High School Information Sessions</u> at the Educational Support Center

This fiscal year, in order to enhance the consultation system for truant children and their guardians in this city, we have arranged dedicated counselors. This initiative started in May of this year.

Column "Special Needs Education"

"29 Talented Individuals in Makurazaki City"

Makurazaki City employs 29 Special Needs Education Supporters (Commonly known as Supporters) who provide learning and daily life support to children primarily in regular school classes who require special assistance. A maximum of 7 supporters are assigned per school. Special Needs Education Supporters work with teachers at school to provide assistance to children who are struggling with daily learning and life. Training is also conducted annually, and their expertise is improving year by year.

In Makurazaki, substantial support is provided in these unseen areas, creating an environment where children can lead happy school lives.
